How did we do?

- We have been instilling pride in being an Alaska Youth Soccer player; competitive teams are wearing the AYSA badge on their sleeve.
- As a state, there was an increase in soccer players, but as an association, we did see a loss due to a long-standing member change affiliation.
- The technical staff is more involved in our competitions by aligning with the PDI, and the referees are better trained.
- Continue to offer Alaska Development Program including sub-regional camps and college tours.
- Comprehensive Code of Conduct and Abuse Prevention training along with Safe Sport.
- Offered more coaching and referee education opportunities.
- AYSA hosted the first Spring Leadership Development Seminar for our member clubs.
- Showed an increase in registered teams at State Cup and expanded the Alaska Futsol League.

Where will focus our resources next year?

- Continue to focus on the grassroots soccer by establishing a Grassroots Council led by our Technical Director.
- Host a statewide Grassroots tournament.
- We will increase the coaching educational opportunities.
- Focus the Spring Leadership Development Seminar on developing the leadership at the club level boards, executives and coaches while providing opportunities for the parents.

With a continued focus on the Athlete experience by offering development opportunities to our member clubs, referees and coaches we will continue to strive to make soccer the preeminent sport in Alaska. We as a state must ensure we emphasize the grassroots experience to grow the sport which will benefit our member clubs and their Athletes.

State Cup

- Referee performance continue to improve every year
- Number of referees went up from 28 to 44 (22 from Fairbanks, 18 from Anchorage and 4 from out-of-state).
- The referee association cannot guarantee having enough referees if the board ever decides to have state cup
 where a solid referee base is not available.
- US Soccer sent National Referee Coach, Retired MLS, and CONCACAF Technical Instructor Richard Heron to Fairbanks.
- Alaska Youth Soccer Supported the invitation of 4 national level referees. We hope to continue the trend of having high quality instruction/mentorship available to us at this event.
- DRAs continue to select referees for State Cup.
- Praise to the Executive Director and President for outstanding collaboration and support

Alaska Referees at Regional/National Events.

- 7 referees attended the ODP championships in Phoenix
- 7 referees attended President's Cup in Salt Lake City
- 9 referees attended Far West Regionals in Hawaii
- Alaska Referees continue to receive regional/national recognition with invitation to US Soccer Development Academy games. James Perryman has been selected to attend the girl's winter academy in Florida

Training & Certification

- We registered 246 Referees this year (compared to 194 last year). We grew by 27%!!!!
- Hosted a second Futsal Clinic taught by National Referee Coach and Professional Futsal Referee Philippe Dor of WA. US Soccer paid for all of his travel expenses per our request.
- Number of Futsal Certified officials went up from 7 to around 20+
- Every aspect of referee certification in now online. Along with that, we require all referee types to attend a certification or recertification clinic once a year to maximize education
- Classroom time has been reduced in favor of field sessions
- Number of grade 7 referees increased
- Looking into funding option to help us lower or eliminate certification fees especially in younger age's groups.

Outlook

- All State Referee Association director's positions are now filled:
 - James Perryman, State Director of Instruction
 - o Bryce Melegari State Director of Assessment
 - Gregg Pralle State Director of Assignors.

All three of them have and are still District Referees Administrators. We look forward to the changes they will bring to their position as State Directors.

- Still Looking to have 2 more District Referee Administrators (DRA) in Kenai and Homer
- Maximize the number of leagues using GO to assign games, like and Ketchikan and other Recreational leagues
- Request clubs to host/sponsor a referee clinic at no cost. The goal is to educate coaches, parents, players and
 recruit more referees. This will help our efforts towards improving the relationship between coaches/players and
 referees; and mitigate referee turnover with improved coaches/players education about the laws of the game. The
 SYRA may come back to AYS board for adoption of more stringent guidelines to help with the fight against
 referee abuse.
 - Looking into showing yellow and red cards to coaches and other bench personnel. Younger and less experienced referees will have more confidence to deal with abuse
- Continue to promote a culture of excellence and professionalism.
- Continue to pursue more ideas for recruitment, training and retention of referees, especially the female pool
- US Soccer Connect is here. When we are ready, we will ask the board to review the assigning policy as game
 official is on its way out.
